SERMON NOTES

Sunday, June 15, 2014



The Sound of a Breaking Heart

2 Samuel 18:1-5, 9-15, 31-33 | Howard Edington Preaching

David rose from humble beginnings to become, arguably, the greatest King in Israel's history. The strength and splendor of Israel was established under David's rule, and God used David's leadership to further God's plan of salvation in Jesus Christ. Though David was godly and successful, he was also a flawed human who struggled to maintain fidelity to God. In this sermon series, we will examine David as a whole person, noting his triumphs and tragedies alike.

Today's scripture focuses on the death of David's son, Absalom. It is a dark time in the life of David. In many ways, Absalom is already gone. He has rebelled against David and his family in numerous ways, and the relationship is broken. With Absalom's death, restoration cannot happen and David's heart is broken.

2 Samuel 18:1-5 - David is preparing to send an army into battle under three captains: Joab, Abishai, and Ittai. He wants to go with them, but they insist he stay back because:

1. They feel David's life is more valuable than theirs (*Worth ten thousand of us*).

2. He is needed in case they require reserves (You are now more help to us in the city).

3. They understand that it may be hard for David to fight against his own son, Absalom. David agrees to stay back, but he asks his three captains to deal gently with Absalom. He makes it known that Absalom is to be captured alive and not mistreated.

2 Samuel 18:9-15 - When Absalom encounters David's army, the mule he is riding goes under a tree, Absalom's head is caught in the branches, and he is left hanging in the tree *between heaven and earth.* Walter Brueggemann paints a picture of this: "Absalom is suspended between life and death, between the sentence of a rebel and the value of a son, between the severity of the king and the yearning of the father. He is no longer living, because he is utterly vulnerable, but he is not dead."

David's captain, Joab, did not heed David's words to deal gently with Absalom; instead, he killed him. Joab felt that Absalom deserved justice and not mercy.

2 Samuel 18:31-33 - When the messenger arrives with news of victory, the only thing David cares about is his son. Absalom is a traitor who had committed great atrocities, but he is still his son, and David wants to know he is safe.

When he hears the news of Absalom's death, David is heartbroken. The knowledge that he contributed to Absalom's undoing through his own sinfulness weighs heavily on David.

This image of David and his unfailing love for his rebellious son reminds us of God's love for us. He continues to love us despite the many ways we rebel against Him. He deals with us not with justice, but with mercy.

- How have you experienced the mercy of God in your life?
- Where do you need to seek restoration in a broken relationship?
- This story is about Absalom's sins, and the sins of David, as well. They followed him. How have you experienced the consequences of your sins?
- Thank God for His mercy and for the many ways He has dealt you grace rather than justice.
