





SERMON NOTES

Jesus and the Road to Emmaus

Luke 24:13-35 Brandon Gaide Preaching

Ah, road trips. It's rare that we make the journey itself the primary reason for going anywhere. But that's exactly what a road trip is all about: focusing more on the journey, and less on the destination. This summer, we will examine what happens to God's people in these in-between places. God often does His greatest work in us when we're traveling in a strange land, out of our comfort zone, away from home, and unsure of our way back.

This week, we begin on the road to Emmaus with Cleopas and his companion. Like many of Jesus' followers, these two people came to Jerusalem expecting to see Jesus finally exerting His authority as the Messiah. His death on a cross crushed their hopes, so, with great sadness, they turn to go home to Emmaus. They are joined along the way by a stranger—a common enough occurrence, but this man is different. His presence touches something deep in their hearts, and, through Luke's masterful storytelling, this simple road trip becomes the setting for an incredible, history-making revelation.

- About one-third of Luke's gospel is devoted to the slow, steady journey of Jesus and His followers from Galilee to Jerusalem (9:51-19:28). When Jesus finally arrives in Jerusalem, Luke has created so much suspense that Jesus' arrival surely must be the climax of His life. This expectation is quickly suppressed by His violent death, leaving His followers bewildered, sad, and without hope. What does that kind of hopelessness feel like? What would you do differently if you believed beyond any doubt that resurrection was not possible?
- Luke inserts Jesus into our text without fanfare (see v.15). There are no trumpet blasts or angels announcing the resurrected Christ to these two sojourners. He simply shows up. What do you like about this way of (re)introducing Jesus? What surprises you about it?
- Jesus shows the two travelers how He is found in "all the Scriptures" (v.27). He doesn't just point to a specific verse. He's telling them that He's the focal point of the entire Old Testament story. How would you explain this idea in your own words? How do you see Jesus connected to the Old Testament story?
- Along the road to Emmaus, Jesus has been walking and conversing with the two travelers. When they invite Him to stay with them, they share a meal together. Nothing about these events is considered supernatural or sacred, but, in the breaking of the bread, their eyes are opened and they realize their guest is the risen Christ. We follow an "everyday" God, who can reveal Himself as easily in a small Emmaus home as in the greatest cathedral. How have you found this to be true in your experience? What comfort does it bring knowing that God can reveal Himself to us anywhere?
- The revealing of their guest's true identity makes Cleopas and his companion immediate evangelists (v.33). They were the first witnesses of a complete redirection of history, one where death was not the ultimate victor, and where Jesus Christ proved Himself more incredible than anyone anticipated. This was the dawn of a new age, and they needed to tell people about it. What prevents us from sharing this good news with similar urgency?
