




FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

We recommend:

A literal version as your primary resource (NASB, ESV, NRSV, NKJV, NIV)

A paraphrase as a supplement (The Message, Living Bible, NLT)

Thou shalt keep silent whilst thine companion is speaking.

Thou shalt only answer the questions in the lesson thou hast completed in writing.

So that thine answers shall be informed by the Biblical text.

Thou shalt honor the confidentiality of prayer requests, limit them to one sentence, limit them to immediate family, and listen not try to "fix" prayer requests of thine companions.

So that trust, love and fellowship may abound and thou shalt be blessed.

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

Similarities to ancient treaties:

- · Description of God's power
- · People of Israel are God's priests
- · God is benevolent to them
- · Stipulates principles for living on the basis of the covenant with God.

Differences with Ancient Treaties and Religion

Ancient codes of ethics are in a legal framework: "if you do X, then Y will be the consequence."

The Ten Commandments

Jews, Catholics and Protestants Differ on the Text

- The Catholic Church uses the account in Deuteronomy and follows the numbering in the Greek translation of the Old Testament (Septuagint).
- Tews and Protestants use the account in Exodus and the Jewish numbering of the Hebrew text.

Introduction to the Study of Luke

Doctor Colossians 4:14 Associate of the Apostle Paul

Native of Antioch But wrote in Achaia

LUKE

Unmarried and without children

Writer & Storyteller

Lived 84 years

Gentile Believer only Gentile believer writer in the New Testament

Luke was an Associate of Paul

- Philemon 1:23-24 and 2 Timothy 4:11
- Luke was not an eyewitness, not one of Jesus' first followers.
- Luke probably joined Paul's group at Troas on Paul's 2nd Missionary Journey and stayed with them until Philippi. Then he rejoined the group for the latter part of the 3rd Missionary Journey. Then he went with Paul from Caesarea to Rome.

- We do not know definitively that Luke is the author of the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles, but it is the most likely explanation.
- He was a great researcher! His writing is historical, reliable, and accurate.
- He writes history in a narrative. He uses an intro, conflict, climax, and resolution.

Luke wrote to Theophilus.

- Theophilus could be of high social status.
- Theophilus could be a literary patron.
- Theophilus is likely to be a Gentile believer.

Luke wrote 2 volumes: Gospel and Acts.

- Luke's Gospel is the longest book of the New Testament, and Acts is 2nd longest.
- Gospel covers the time Jesus was on earth and Acts covers the disciples' mission following Jesus' ascension.
- There are practical limits to what a gospel can cover.

What was Luke's purpose in writing?

- Luke wanted to emphasize God's active love and mercy.
- Luke wanted to record the history of salvation which is accomplished through Jesus. Jesus is the center!
- He believed that the Old Testament through John the Baptist is the era of Promise. The era of Fulfillment goes from Jesus' ministry through his return. John the Baptist was the bridge between the 2 eras, and the Spirit is a sign of fulfillment. See Luke 3:15-18. (according to Darrell L. Bock)
