QUESTIONS What Are You Seeking? God ASKS Of US • — John 1:35-42 Brandon Gaide Preaching

Most parents tend to remember their children's first words. It's a defining moment for the child, whether they say "ball" or "mama" or "ice cream," because we tend to pay close attention to how things begin.

The first words Jesus speaks in His public ministry are a question: "What are you seeking?" It's an unusual way to begin. The more typical beginning is what a campaigning politician might say: "Here's what I offer." But Jesus, the Son of God and the Messiah, begins not with a personal declaration about Himself, but a sincere question to us. "What are you seeking?" His question gets at the essence of His ministry: others-centered, humble, and aimed at our deepest needs. In other words, Jesus didn't come to earth to promote Himself or to seek glory (even though it's rightfully His). He came for...us. He therefore launches His ministry with a question that immediately inquires into the deepest parts of our lives.

- 1. When John the Baptist sees Jesus, he announces, "Behold, the Lamb of God" (v. 36)! Of all the ways He could describe Jesus (Messiah, Son of God, King of Kings, etc.) why might He choose this title? To what does the title refer? What kind of expectations might John be cultivating in his disciples regarding Jesus?
- 2. John the Baptist doesn't protest when two of his disciples leave him and begin to follow Jesus. This is a sign of great leadership. John knows his purpose is to be the forerunner to the Messiah, humbly pointing people towards the Messiah (recall when John later says, "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30)). Who have you encountered in your own life who has selflessly directed you toward Jesus Christ?
- 3. Jesus' question, "What are you seeking," assumes the disciples have begun following him with certain expectations. When you first started following Jesus, what expectations did you have?
- 4. The disciples cleverly answer Jesus' question with a question of their own, "Rabbi, where are you staying?" It's not a direct response to Jesus' question, but is still suggestive of what they're seeking. They're interested in Jesus, but want to be able to explore Jesus on their own terms, perhaps in a less public setting or at their leisure. How do we use this same approach with Jesus? In what ways do we prefer to ask Jesus for His address in the event that we might want to learn more about Him?
- 5. Jesus' response is masterful in its simplicity: "Come and you will see." How is that different than just telling the disciples where he lives?
- 6. What have you "seen" since you've started following Jesus? What's a significant discovery you've made on the path of following Jesus?
